In The Classroom

The second grade team will work with students and their families to support students' success in all content areas. In the classroom, your child will be exposed to a literacy-enriched classroom, including guided reading, reading/writing workshop, student-centered learning stations, technology access, and hands-on manipulatives in a positive and cooperative learning community.

A few academic expectations second-graders are expected to master by the end of the year are listed below.

- *passing grades in all subject areas
- *memorizing addition and subtraction facts
- *recognizing and counting coins
- *telling time to the nearest minute
- *achieving an Imagine Learning score on or above grade level
- *achieving an Amplify score on or above grade level

At Home

Wortham Oaks parents and staff have developed ideas about how families can support students' success in reading and math. Families may have other ideas to add to this list.

*Have fun with math! Use everyday materials at home such as coins, a deck of cards, measuring tools, and/or recipes to explore math at home

*Master addition and subtraction math facts by practicing together

*Encourage reading by using a variety of sources such as books, magazines, newspapers, computers, comics etc....

*Attend Family Nights

*Make practicing skills a game! Put word cards around the house and ask children to read or spell the card before entering a room

***Remember, parents are teachers too!**
